Williams Bay High School is ranked #1 in Walworth County and #31 in Wisconsin according to the 2024 Best High Schools by U.S. News & World Report. The 2024 Best High Schools ranked approximately 17,655 public high schools based on a broad range of data to determine which high schools do the best job of preparing students to be college and career ready.

The 2024 Best High Schools rankings take a holistic approach to evaluating schools, looking at five factors: college readiness, college curriculum breadth, state assessment proficiency, state assessment performance, and graduation rate.

Valedictorian Aaron Johnson

Aaron Johnson has been a part of the Williams Bay School District since 4K. During that time, he routinely challenged himself academically, whether

that be in the classroom or in extracurricular activities. He took numerous honors and AP courses throughout his high school career, and held his place on the high honor roll for all four years. Additionally, he excelled in extracurricular academic activities such as Academic Bowl and Math Team. In the former, he placed first individually for Physical Science his freshman year and third individually in General Science senior year. In the Math Team, he has placed first individually in Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II, and Advanced Math in his eighth grade, freshman, sophomore, and senior years respectively.

Outside of the classroom, Aaron had consistent involvement in many different clubs and groups. He was a member of the Spanish Club for four years, being elected Secretary for his senior year, and a member of the History Club for three, serving as the Co-Chair of the Media and Design Committee. He was also a representative for the Student Council and a member of the DRIVEN Committee, in which he participated in many community and school outreach events. Perhaps most significantly, Aaron shaped his music career for the majority of his life. He played the clarinet for Concert Band, Honors Band, Jazz Band, and the pit orchestra throughout his years learning the instrument, taking both Solo & Ensemble events to WSMA State. In addition, he studied the piano under Mrs. Christine Groth for ten years, earning numerous accolades in that time, and became a Level 9 Certified Pianist with High Honors under the Royal Conservatory of Music. Aaron utilized these skills in school, playing piano for the Jazz Band and keyboard in the pit orchestra for several high school musicals; in addition, he took piano solos to WSMA State for five consecutive years.

Upon graduation, Aaron plans to attend UW-Madison and pursue a degree in biology.



Salutatorian Dylan Hulke

Dylan Hulke spent his high school career working towards preparing himself to be a leader in the real world. He worked hard to become the

captain of the History Bowl Team and the founder and president of the Chess Club, while also striving to be a leader outside of the classroom. He spent his time outside of school working at GLAS (Geneva Lakes Education and STEAM) Education on various projects, eventually leading his own. He worked on the LENSS sensor, a more affordable alternative to other light pollution monitors, as well as the water quality sensor for Geneva Lake, which saw him lead a team to build a custom sensor from scratch to monitor the health of the lake. On his own, he worked to create a cheap yet effective prototype sensor that would automatically adjust lighting in the school to significantly reduce the amount of wasted light, therefore noticeably reducing power costs. Although the school decided not to implement this system, it could still be applied to other buildings to save energy. Additionally, he worked to be a leader in the classroom, striving to set an example for his fellow students, whether that be through his hard work in projects or his leading of the percussion section in the band. He received multiple notable awards, such as placing first in geography at the Trailways Academic Bowl two years in a row, as well as being recognized for his achievements at the Geneva Lake Rotary Club and the Trailways Academic Conference. Towards the end of his senior year, he worked on constructing a rocket from scratch, outfitting it with sensors to record telemetry data.

Dylan hopes to pursue a career working on rockets or satellites, majoring in aerospace engineering at the University of Minnesota Twin-Cities.

High School Math Teacher



From the Desk of Dr. White, District Administrator

On behalf of the Williams Bay School District, I would like to express our deepest gratitude for your support in approving the recent operational referendum. I am grateful for the Williams Bay community and its willingness to engage in open and honest conversation about the merits of the referendum question. We understand that this decision was not made lightly, and we are humbled by the overwhelming support that we have received from the Williams Bay community. Your commitment to our schools has demonstrated your understanding of the importance of education and its impact on our children's future.

Now the school district must focus on addressing the district's key priorities to achieve the best possible outcomes for student learning and success. Utilizing the District's Strategic Plan, we will focus on the following four goals:

Ensure a positive learning climate and school culture to promote continuous student growth and achievement in the Williams Bay School Community.

Our school community was extremely clear through all our presentations that it values high academic performance and high-quality education. Recently, Williams Bay High School was recognized by U.S. News and World Report as the highest ranked high school in Walworth County and 31st in the state of Wisconsin. This standard of excellence has become the norm for our district and one that we strive to maintain. We know that some data indicators did not meet the expectations that have been established and we must work hard to ensure that every student graduates from our school district college and career ready. We will use the funding that was maintained by the successful referendum to maintain low classes sizes, protect programs, and to ensure high quality learning experiences are given to each student. This includes providing rigorous instruction in reading and math and giving students access to hands-on activities that allow them to be prepared to attend college or enter the trades.

Develop a systematic process to attract, train and retain high quality staff.

We shared throughout the referendum process that the district had not be able to maintain competitive wage and salary compensation for our employees. This has resulted in an inability to attract and retain high-quality staff. We committed to using the consistent funding from the referendum to ensure that our young educators earn a livable wage as promptly as possible and that all our employees were competitively compensated in comparison to educators in neighboring and regional school districts. The Board is working to implement a compensation model that will allow the district to attract and retain high quality staff.

Manage district finances facilities and resources in a responsible, efficient, and effective manner.

The Board of Education understands that the Williams Bay community expects that District to be great stewards of taxpayer funding. We must continue to live within our means. The district will continue to make adjustments in response to changes in enrollment and student needs.

We also must maintain our facilities in accordance with our ten-year facilities plan. Now that we know we will have adequate funding, we will be completing two facilities projects this summer. First, the West parking lot has deteriorated and is in poor condition. It needed to be fixed for an extended period, but the expense did not fit in the budget. The cracks, crumbling asphalt, holes, and swales in the parking lot make it hazardous, especially during the winter months and at night. Secondly, outdoor security cameras were installed in 2015-2016. The

quality of these cameras and the system are poor and outdated. To ensure the safety of our students and staff, and to protect the facilities, an upgrade is important and highly needed.

Foster community partnerships to benefit the overall development of the school community.

The Williams Bay School District belongs to the community. We will continue to make the facility available to the public and we will continue to contribute to the community through service projects and active participation in community events. We know community members value transparency. We will continue to publish newsletters, our year in review, and maintain communication with the public so that everyone is aware of the district's progress towards these goals.


