The ofrendas are set up to honor loved ones who have passed as a way to celebrate their lives with some of their favorite things. Ofrendas may include favorite foods, pan de muerto (a special bread), a glass of water and salt, and some photographs of the loved one.

Day of the Dead is also a very colorful celebration. The two most often used colors are orange and black, not to be confused with Halloween. The orange symbolizes the flowers commonly seen around ofrendas, marigolds, and the black represents death. Day of the Dead takes a positive outlook on death and makes a celebration out of it. In Spanish culture, death is sad; however, with Day of the Dead celebrations, people are able to honor and preserve the lives of their loved ones.

In addition to the tour, there was an interactive portion of the trip where the Spanish Club members made their own paper mache sugar skulls. Sugar skulls, as they learned, are an important part of the Day of the Dead and are very personal to the individual they represent.

Finishing off the day, lunch was served at Cafe el Sol.

Overall, this was a very positive experience for the students and the local community. It is important that we keep traditions alive, as well as honor those we have lost in a positive light. There is no better way to do so than to learn about and to celebrate Day of the Dead.

Most people are familiar with Apple. The company was founded in 1976 by Steve Jobs and Steve Wozniak. As soon as the company went from private to public, the sales and revenue of the company drastically increased. Along with the successful sales of the company, investors have also seen major success with the company.

Apple is a part of the NASDAQ. The company went public in 1980, starting at an initial \$22 per share. At the time this article is being written, a share costs \$147.87. That's for one single share. For most investors, however, this price point does not push them away. In fact, it brings more investors because of the recent trend of Apple stock over the last year. Since 2018, the stock prices have more than doubled. Most of Apple's revenue comes from their wide array of products, from the Airpod headphones to the newest Macbook Pro that has a price point of almost \$2,000. 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History of Basketball

Basketball dates back to December 1, 1891, and it is the only major sport that was created in the U.S. It was first created at a YMCA by James Naismith. The first basketball game was played with peach baskets as the goals. People heard about this game when its rules were published in YMCA's magazine called Triangle.

In the beginning of basketball, the number of players on a team varied, but eventually it was decided that based on the size of the gym, a team would consist of five or seven players. After a while, the rule became five players per team.

Basketball slowly began to spread to other countries. It first became known in Canada, which is also where James Naismith was from. Then it spread to other countries like France, India, and China. The YMCA benefited from the creation of basketball and they saw a dramatic increase in membership (until they started banning basketball because it used up so much of the gym space). Basketball allowed a limited number of players to play, meaning that a gym space meant for fifty to sixty people was used by only ten to twelve players.

When the YMCA banned basketball, some people canceled their YMCA memberships and rented out other gyms so they could continue to play basketball. Eventually in 1893, the first basketball and iron hoop were adopted and replaced the use of soccer balls and the older hoops.

As the game grew, it was picked up by different colleges, the first one being either Iowa state or Geneva College in Pennsylvania. Multiple rules committees were founded for different playing levels in 1936: the NBC for professional, the NCAA for college, and NFSHA for high school. In 1949, two professional leagues merged and created the NBA. Basketball's growth as a game was fast, but its popularity didn't increase right away. When cable TV became popular, the game, along with the NBA, grew extremely popular due to star players like Michael Jordan. The NBA's growth has continued to increase with more sponsors coming in and its popularity shows no sign of stopping.

Last year, WBHS students found a burial ground that was unknowingly being desecrated by the owners of the property. After talking with the owner of the property, History Club students and Mrs. Soplanda decided that they should protect the burial ground by registering it with the state of Wisconsin. However, after contacting the Forest County Potawatomi people, the direct ancestors of the natives who lived on Geneva Lake, the plan changed. The Forest County Potawatomi people wanted the ground to be registered with them instead of with the State of Wisconsin. During this process of getting it registered with them, students realized something. Nobody, including the Forest County Potawatomi people, seemed to know much about the natives of this area, so the Forest County Potawatomi people asked us to research Williams Bay's natives. Thus, the burial ground committee was created, with the purpose being to research and preserve the history of Williams Bay's original settlers.

The students were already researching and preserving the Potawatomi legacy, but they decided they needed to do more. They decided that a vital part of preserving the Potawatomi legacy is educating the public. The students brought it upon themselves to commemorate the natives by hosting a public commemoration called "The Last Harvest" which was written about by the *Lake Geneva Regional News*. The History Club recently had the opportunity to meet with the Williams Bay Women's League and present their findings, and they are still working on a research paper to present to the Potawatomi people. Until then, there will be many more adventures for the Williams Bay History Club!

No Time to Die- Movie Review By Nicholas Schnobel

No Time to Die is the 25th James Bond movie, and actor Daniel Craig's 5th. It is also the final installment of one of the most iconic film series ever created, so expectations were at an all-time high. The film has received mixed reviews from fans. Some believe that the ending was perfect, while others believe that Bond's legacy was left "unfulfilled" and that the film's director, Cary Joji Fukunaga, played it too safe.

I thought that the movie was pretty good (but my opinion probably doesn't matter since I have only viewed a few Bond films). However, many people believe that the film is average. Some critics believe that there were too many slow parts in the film, which could be a result of its record high run time-a lengthy two hours and forty-three minutes.

"Though the action scenes were great, there were not as many of them as there were in previous films," my dad told me. He also thought that there was a lot more talking and romance than usual.

It wasn't the action-packed, fast-paced film all the way through that James Bond fans are used to. Another problem some critics had was with the villain, Lyutsifer Safin, portrayed by Rami Malek. Though he has a compelling story, many fans didn't think he was good enough to be the villain in the final movie of the series. Safin is a terrorist leader who wants to take out the criminal organization "Spectre" because they assassinated his father, who supplied Spectre with poisons. This does not mean that he is on Bond's side, though. To take down the organization, he ends up stealing a highly classified DNA-targeting nanoweapon. Safin mass produces the weapon to use on more than just Spectre, and it is up to Bond to stop him. This led to another criticism from fans; they thought that the weapon itself stood out more as a threat than the actual villain did. At the end of the day, Safin is just another villain that wants to watch the world burn. He doesn't have a compelling argument for what he is doing or think that he is in the right. This was kind of disappointing because I think that villains who think they are right are the best. A great example of this is Thanos from the Avengers: Infinity War and Endgame. Even though he wants to take out half of the universe, he believes that he is doing the right thing because it will help solve things like overpopulation, poverty, and hunger. However, I don't think this criticism of the villain decreased the overall quality of the movie by a significant amount.

Even though I listed many negatives about the film, I don't think it is bad by any means. Some of those criticisms were just nit-picks by longtime James Bond fans and professional movie critics. With that being said, I want this review to end on a positive note. In my opinion, it is the action that makes the movie great. The iconic Aston Martin DB5 made an appearance towards the start which made for an outstanding action scene that all 007 fans know and love. At the very start, we see a masked figure walking through the snow to a house in the middle of nowhere which almost makes you feel like you're watching a horror film. There is a suspenseful scene in a foggy forest with car chases and helicopters. A mys-
