Most Unique Summer Olympic Sports Of All Time

The Summer Olympics are home to some of the strangest sports. Throughout its history, the Olympics have held competitions that spread upon a wide variety, ranging from common sports like basketball and track and field, to more obscure events like the horse long jump. Here are some of the weirdest sports to ever be played:

Racewalking

Racewalking first became an Olympic event in 1904. Racewalking differs from normal walking and running because of rules established by the International Association of Athletics Federation (IAAF). These rules state that the racewalker must maintain one leg in contact with the ground, and the front leg must remain straight from the moment of first contact with the ground until the vertical upright position. Racewalking competitions consisted of the twenty-kilometer, and the Marathon Race Walk Relay Mixed, in which each team has two women and two men who each walk ¼ of the marathon. Walking is usually seen as a casual activity, but the Olympics have been able to transform it into a competitive sport.

Equestrian

At the Olympic level, Equestrian is a horse-riding sport across three different competitions. In Equestrian Jumping, riders and horses compete against the clock while jumping over obstacles. Time penalties are added depending on how many obstacles are hit along the run. In Equestrian Dressage, a horse and rider perform a choreographed series of maneuvers around the course set to music, and judges evaluate both the difficulty and success. Eventing combines dressage and jumping with cross country, which consists of running a long course of designed obstacles. Versatility for both horse and rider is the key to success.

Hot Air Ballooning

Taking place in the 1900 Olympics, Hot Air Ballooning was a very strange competition. Hot air balloon drivers compete in terms of distance, altitude, duration, minimum distance from a point, longest distance traveled, and photography from a balloon. While soaring the air in a hot air balloon may be a great way to spend your peaceful afternoon, it wasn't too entertaining for the crowd and was removed by the next Olympics.

Richard Petty's 200 Career Wins

Plot Summary

Scythe, by Neal Shusterman, is a dystopian novel set in a future where humanity has overcome disease, death, and the process of aging. In this future, an all-knowing AI system, the Thunderhead, is held responsible for academic progression and the sustenance of society; however, a group known as the Scythedom is held liable for population control. The two protagonists, Citra Terranova and Rowan Damisch, are faced with the golden opportunity of becoming apprentices under the renowned Scythe Faraday. The novel takes many twists and turns as the protagonists are faced with the social dilemmas of a corrupt system.

Personal Reactions

Jaylee Carr:

Throughout the novel, I found the plot to be uniquely fast-paced. Shusterman's writing is vivid enough to allow the reader to visualize the dystopian world as he created it. Additionally, the characters, Citra and Rowan, are well-developed and their struggles against the ethics and morality of taking a life feel real and engaging. As to my favorite character, Rowan undergoes a more significant and dramatic internal transformation, especially while enduring the torturous training methods brought forth by his mentor. Furthermore, the story's creativity highlights humanity's adaptation in correspondence to the evolution of artificial intelligence, which I found to be realistically ambiguous. Overall, the book did a great job masking the mystery behind the plot twists, although I would've liked to see more of a dynamic change within some of the characters. I would rate this book a six out of ten.

Lindsey Dobbertin:

I found *Scythe*, by Neal Shusterman, imaginative and intriguing. I enjoyed Shusterman's unique style of writing, letting us see the inner turmoil both Citra and Rowan faced through dual points of view. The book itself has a nice balance of thought-provoking topics and entertaining scenes. Even though the book contains darker subjects such as death, Shusterman balances it out with humor and witty banter. I also liked the journal entries from different scythes that he included because it allowed us to see into the minds of other scythes while remaining focused on the two main characters. I enjoyed the development of Rowan and Citra's characters from when they are first chosen as apprentices to the end when one is chosen as the final scythe. Overall, I would rate it seven out of ten because of the exciting plot, characters, and unique writing. I would recommend it to readers interested in dystopian/ sci-fi books with thrilling plot twists and characters with depth.

The book *Scythe*, by Neal Shusterman, is a thought-provoking book that begs all readers to take a step back and reflect on modern society and the direction of our ever-morphing world. 

Three of the Most Effective Studying Methods By Avery Kimmerly

The Feynman Technique is a learning method that enhances and simplifies the main ideas of difficult concepts for greater understanding and memory retention. This method is broken down into a few simple steps that focus on retaining the key ideas of a concept while, also, bridging information gaps:

- Identify an area or subject to study and conduct base-level research.
- Simplify the information and pretend to teach the concept (information) to someone else, typically a young/uninformed individual.
- Reflect on understanding gaps by identifying "weak" portions of the figurative lecture.
- Continue to research and strengthen understanding of concepts to build a stronger base of knowledge.
- Repeat.
- This method is extremely effective at not only identifying knowledge gaps, but it's also effective at storing information in simple, understandable ways. While some concepts may be difficult to comprehend at first, simplifying information into bite-sized chunks can often make the learning process much more effective.

The Leitner System is the learning method of using flashcards and repetition to familiarize oneself with a given concept/topic. Being how universally available flashcards are, physically and digitally, this method is one of the most common test-prep and studying techniques. While this method may not have as much glitz and glam as other more methodical and planned-out techniques, it is incredibly effective. If you are thinking about trying out the Leitner System but would prefer to keep your studying digital, there are many apps/websites to choose from:

- Quizlet is a widely known study platform that offers many different study settings for users; one of the primary study setting being the flashcard mode. The main downside to Quizlet is that it now requires a fee for access to certain features and/or continued use of a given flashcard set.
- Knowt is essentially the same platform as Quizlet, except for the fact that it doesn't have as many study features. The bonus to Knowt is that it doesn't have a user fee, and it allows unlimited access to flashcard sets.
- Anki is a study app that uses an algorithm of spaced repetition through flashcards for users to better understand the concepts/principles that they're learning. While Anki can be extremely effective and useful, the interface can be difficult for beginners, and it isn't the easiest to access.

The Pomodoro Technique is a study method that utilizes small bursts of attention with spaced-out breaks to effectively complete work and make progress towards a greater assignment/goal. The principle of the Pomodoro Technique rests on completing twenty minutes of work and receiving a five minute break. This work-break cycle is repeated four times, in which the final break is twenty minutes. If users wish to continue working/ studying they may, but their breaks would return to five minutes in length following the twenty-minute break. This method is really effective in capturing peak productivity and allows the brain enough time to rest, which, in the long term, prevents procrastination and boredom.

While students at Williams Bay High School no longer have to trouble themselves with the tempestuous study for finals, it's still important for students to retain the information they learn. All three of these study methods are extremely effective, and each of them has an entirely different purpose. I would recommend anyone who hasn't tried one of these methods to give them a shot and watch the impact it will have on overall concept retention and understanding.

History of Jack-O'-Lanterns By Quinn Peyer and Derek Johnson

The name, jack-o'-lantern, comes from an Irish folktale about a man named Stingy Jack. Irish immigrants brought the tradition to America, home of the pumpkin, and it became an essential part of Halloween festivities.

One version of jack-o'-lanterns may have originated from an Irish legend, which first appeared in print in the 19th century, about a man nicknamed "Stingy Jack." According to the story, he invited the devil to have a drink with him. Stingy Jack didn't want to pay for his drink so he convinced the devil to turn himself into a coin so that Jack could use it to buy their drinks. Once the Devil changed, Jack kept the money and put it into his pocket next to a silver cross, which prevented the Devil from changing back into his original form. Jack decided to free the Devil under one condition. That he would not be able to bother Jack for a year, and if Jack died, his soul would not be claimed. The next year, when Jack's promise was up, Jack tricked the Devil into climbing up a tree to pick fruit. While in the tree, Jack carved a cross in the tree, symbolizing the devil couldn't come down until Jack was promised not to bother Jack for ten more years. After Jack died, God stopped allowing terrible people in heaven. When the Devil heard about it, he got upset at Jack for the trick he played, so he wouldn't allow Jack into his Underworld. He sent Jack into the night with lit coal to lead his way. Jack put the coal into a carved out turnip and has roamed the Earth with it ever since. The Irish began to refer to this ghostly figure as "Jack of the Lantern," and then, just "jacko'-lantern."

People soon started to make their own versions of jack-o'lanterns by carving faces into turnips and putting them in their windows to scare away Stingy Jack and other evil spirits. People also started using beet roots and vegetable carvings before coming to the U.S. and helping change jack-o'-lanterns forever. The foreigners brought over pumpkins and the Americans decided to use those for their jack-o'-lanterns.
